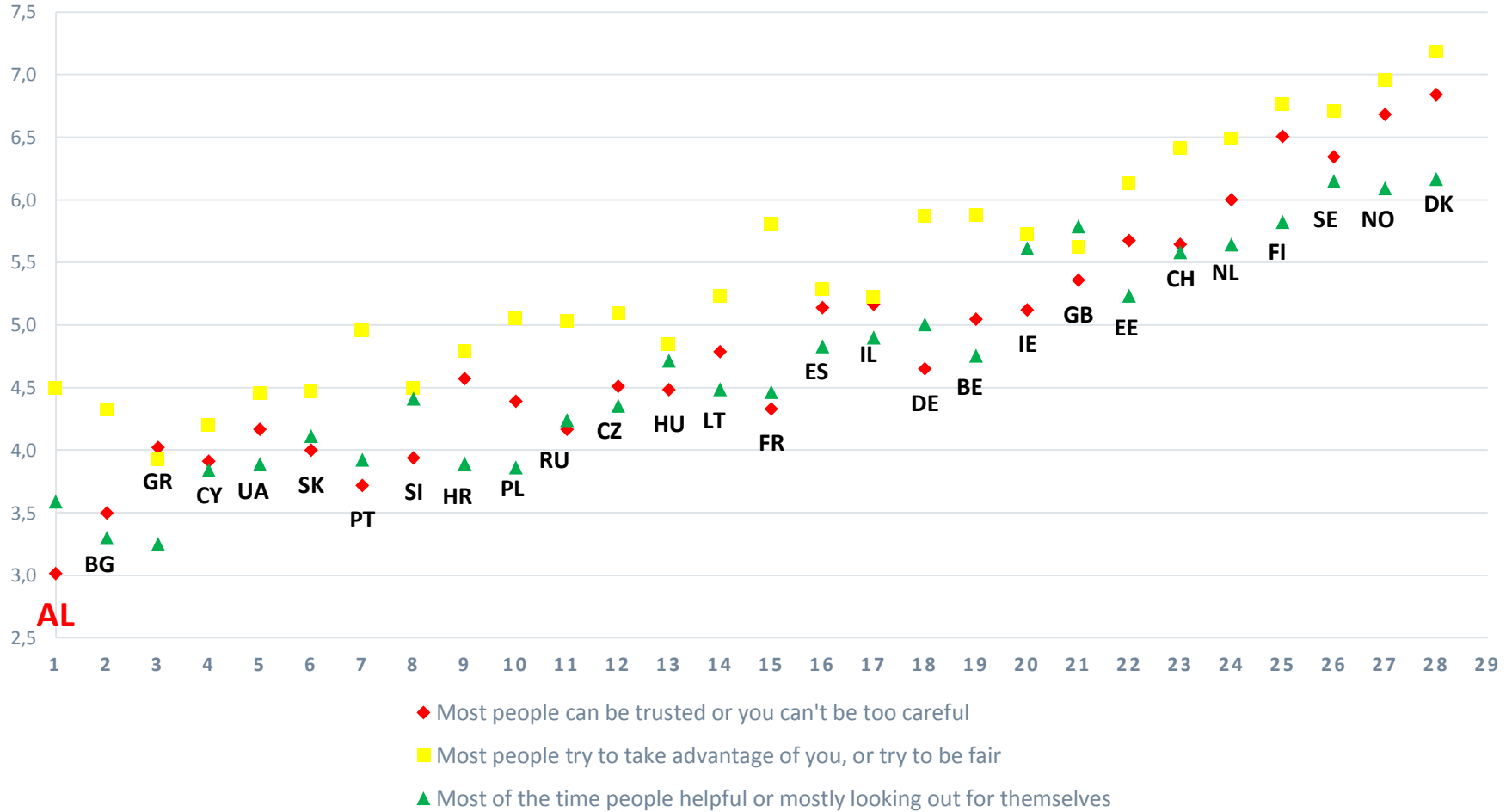

# Social Trust (0 to 10)

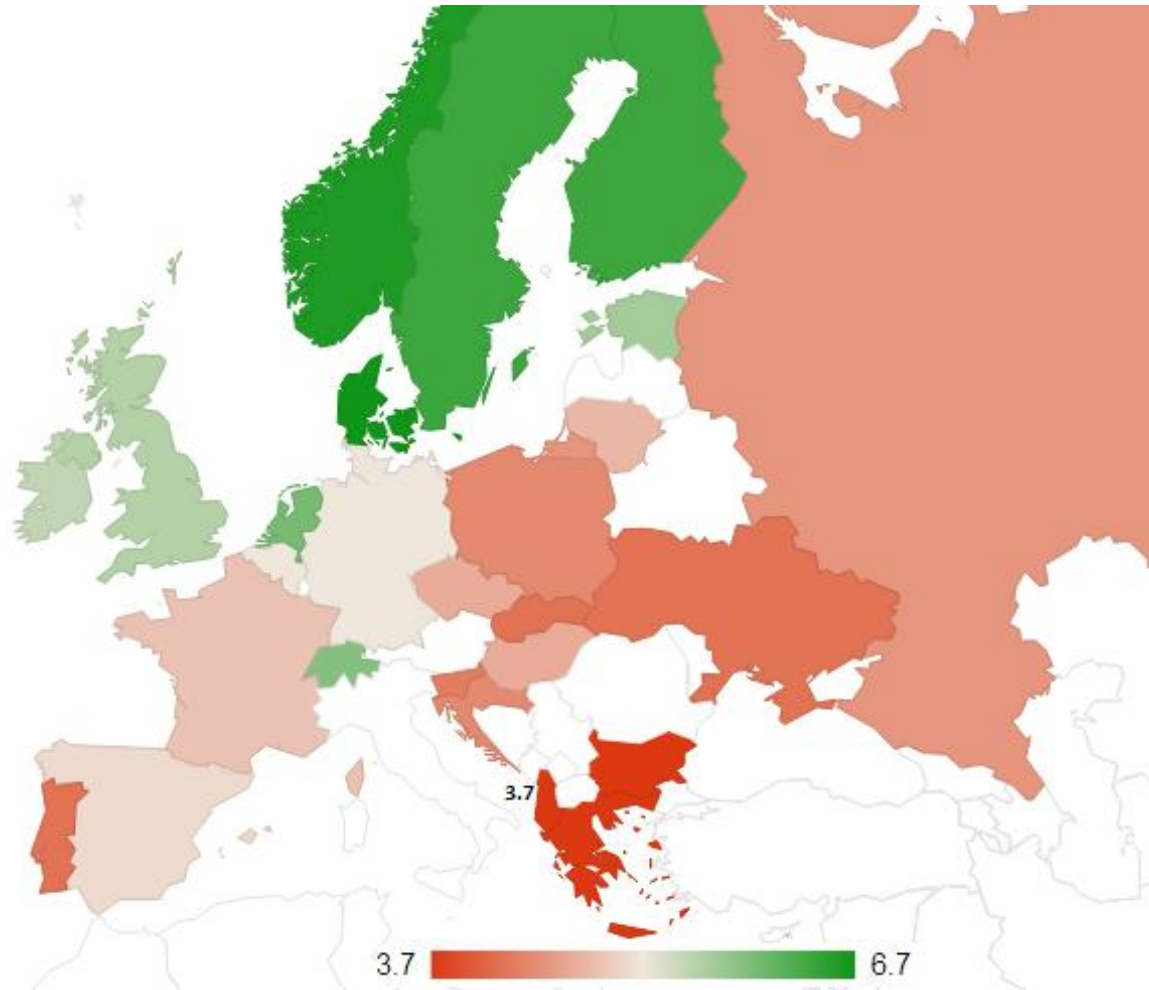
Social trust in Europe

- ▲ Most of the time people helpful or mostly looking out for themselves

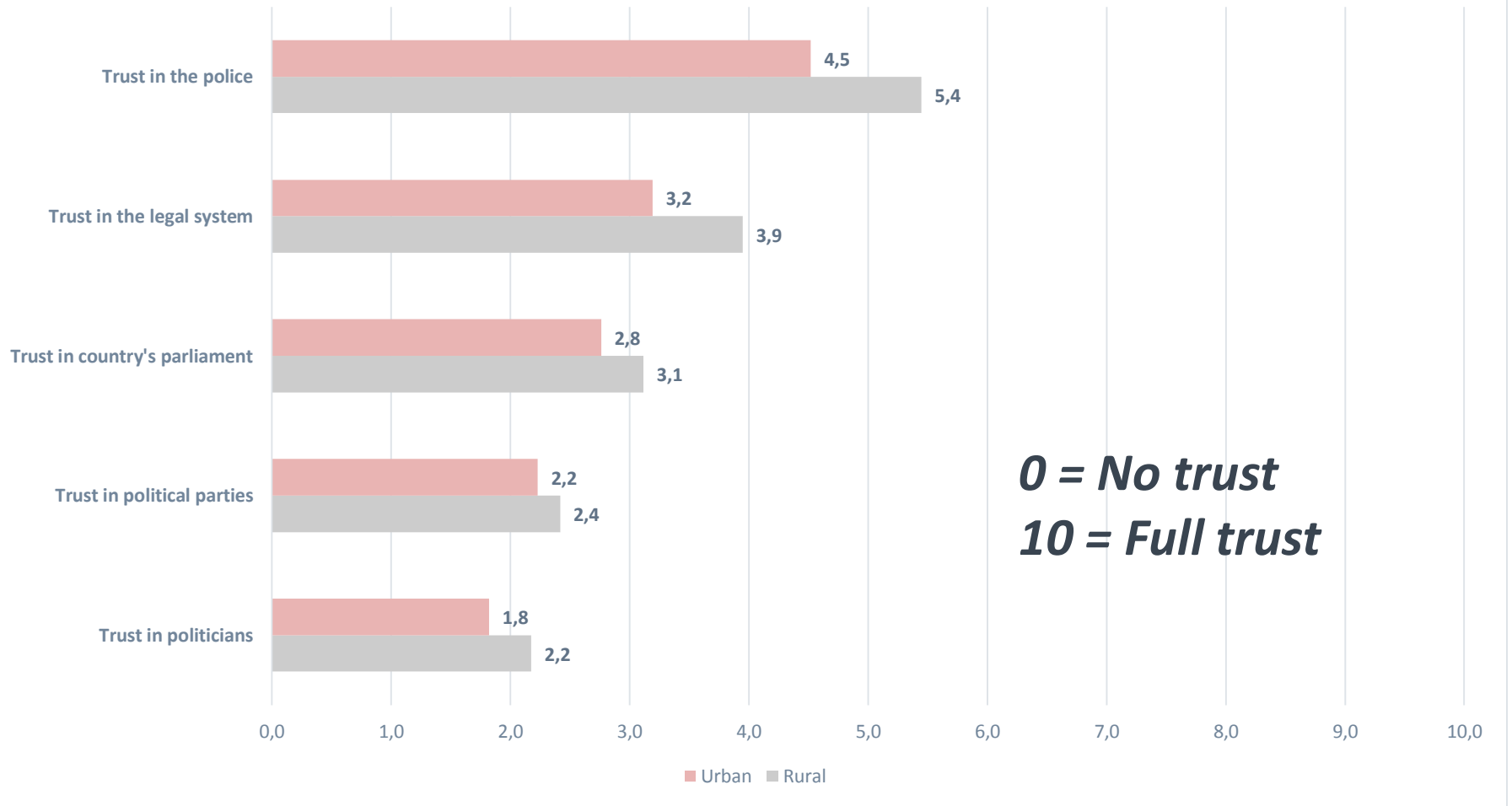
**0 = No trust at all**

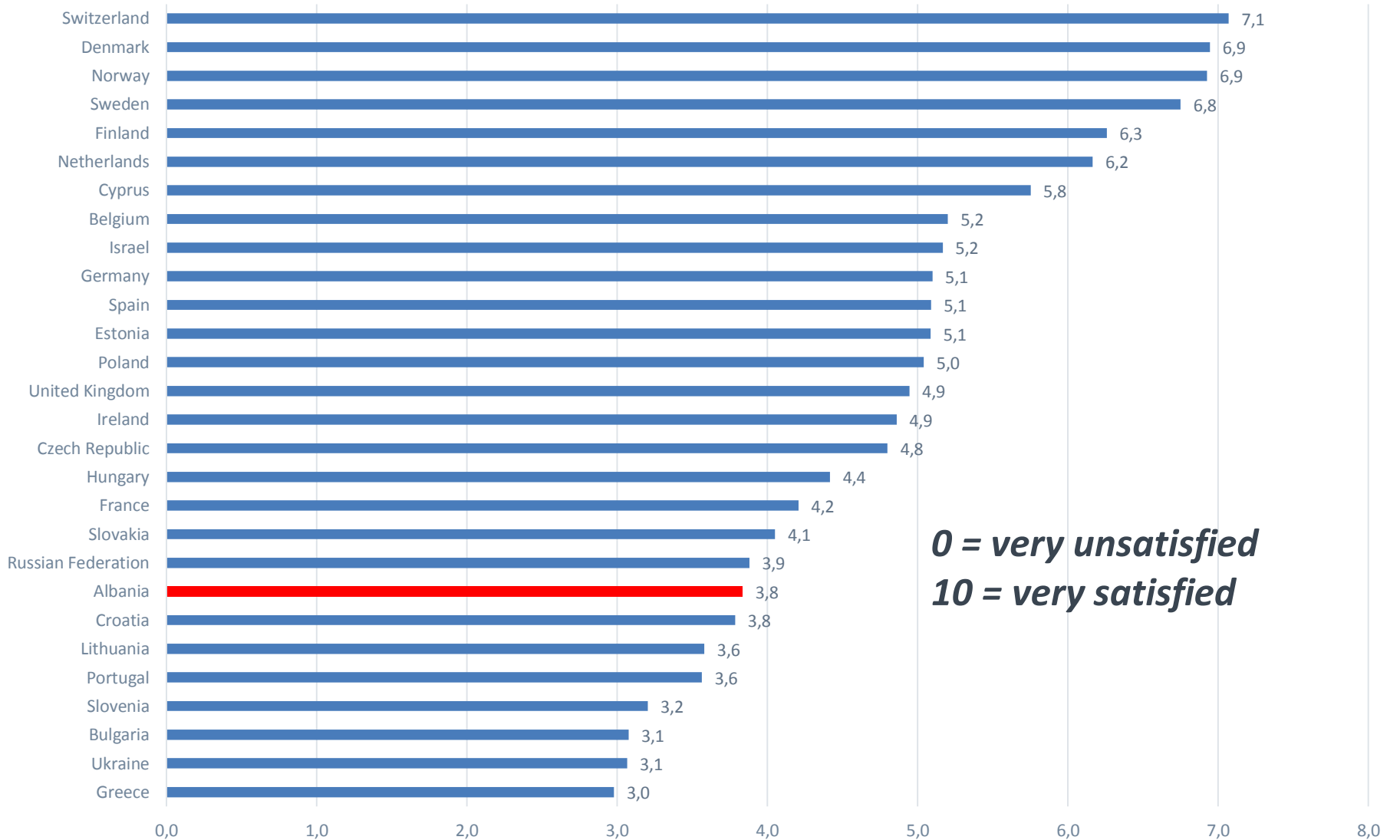


# Trust in local institutions and actors (Urban-Rural)

Trust in national institutions (Albania)

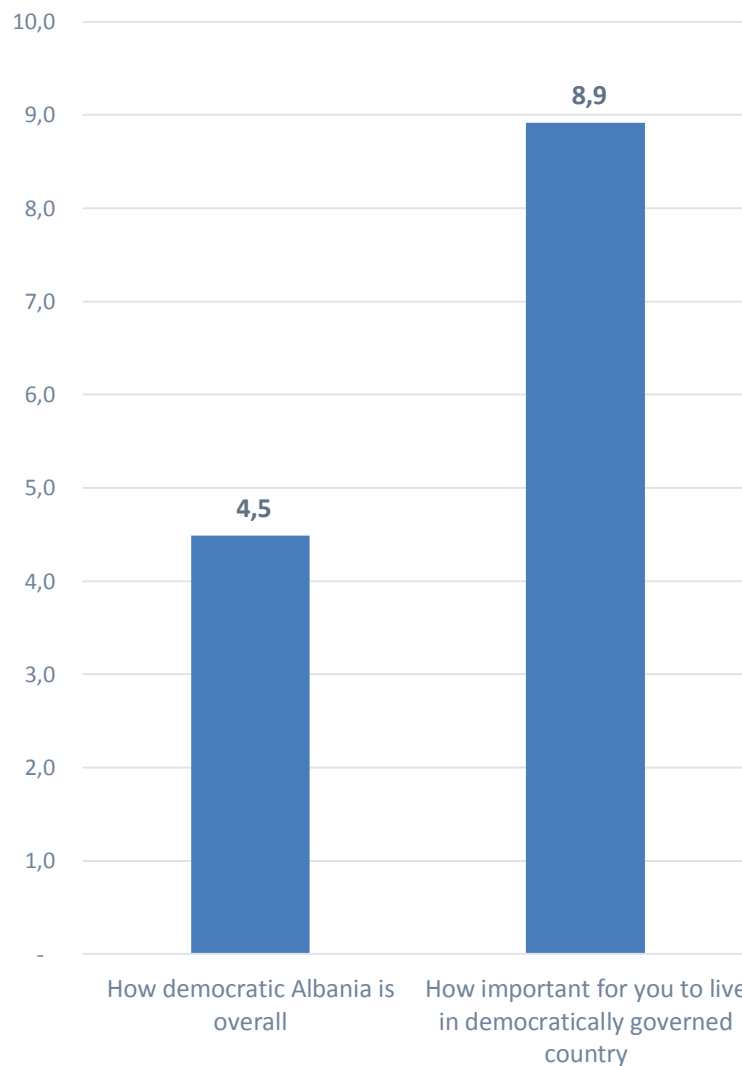

Democracy index in Albania (from 0 to 10)

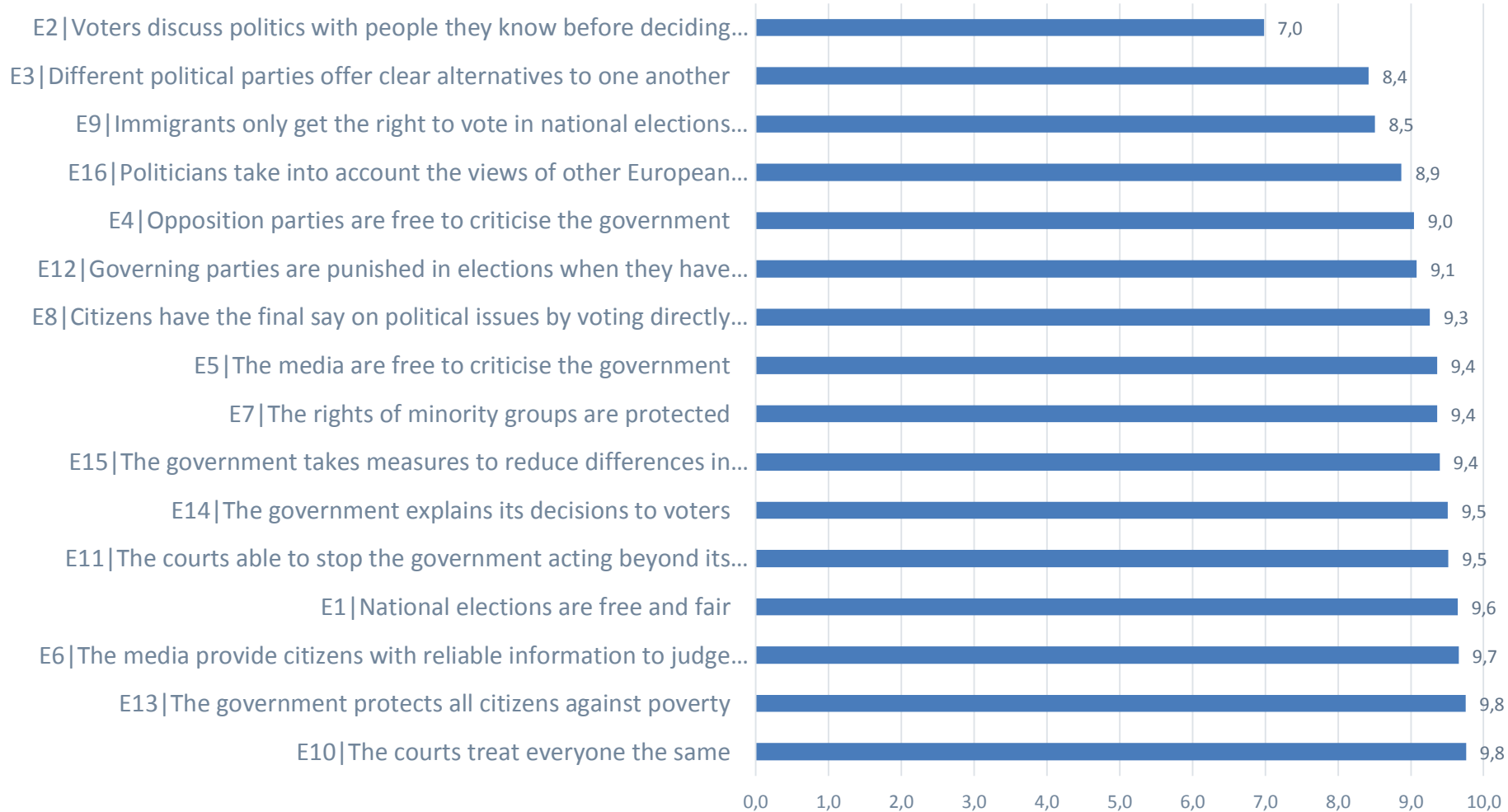


**0 = Very unsatisfied**  
**10 = Very satisfied**

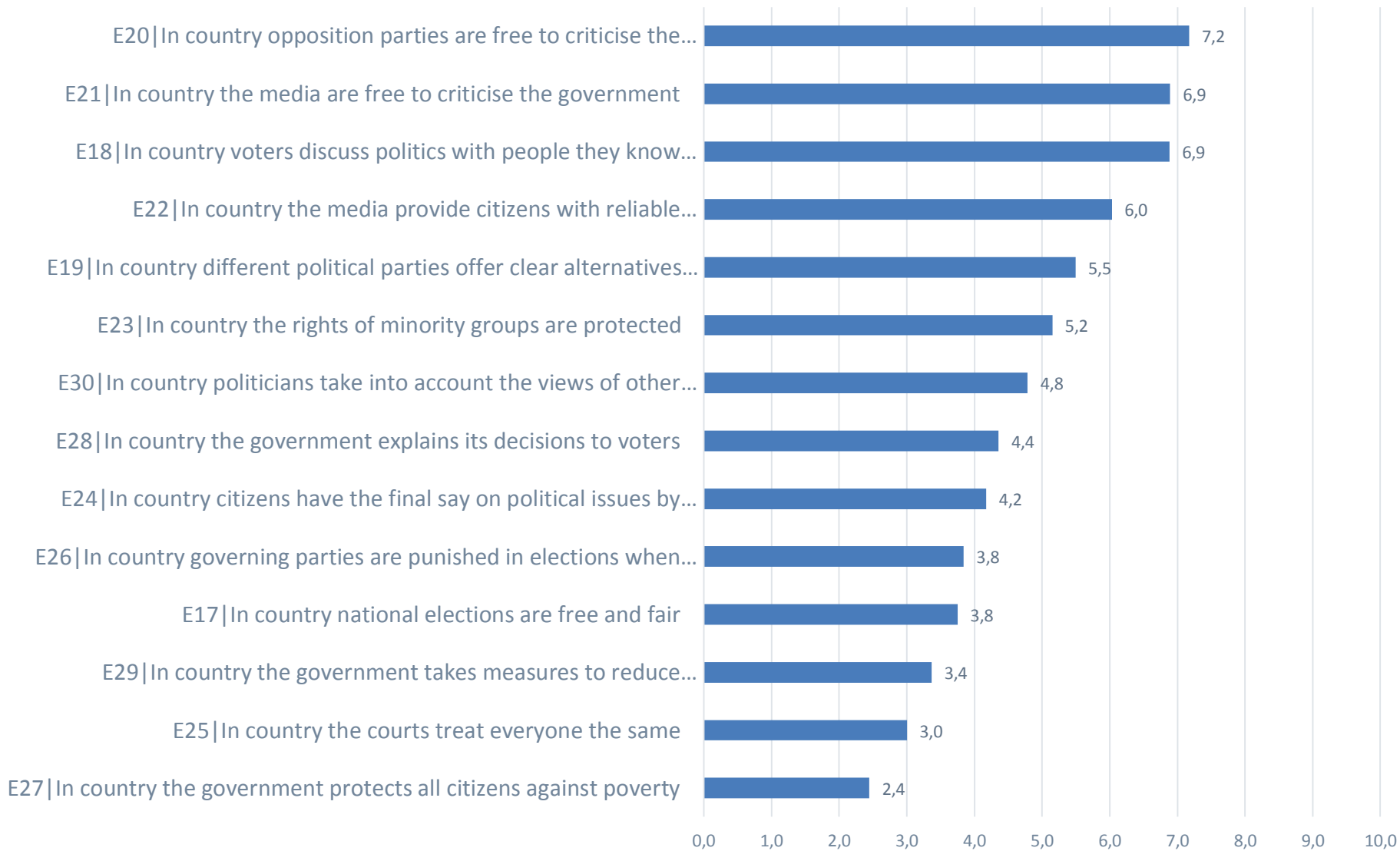
**0 = Not important**

How important for democracy in general



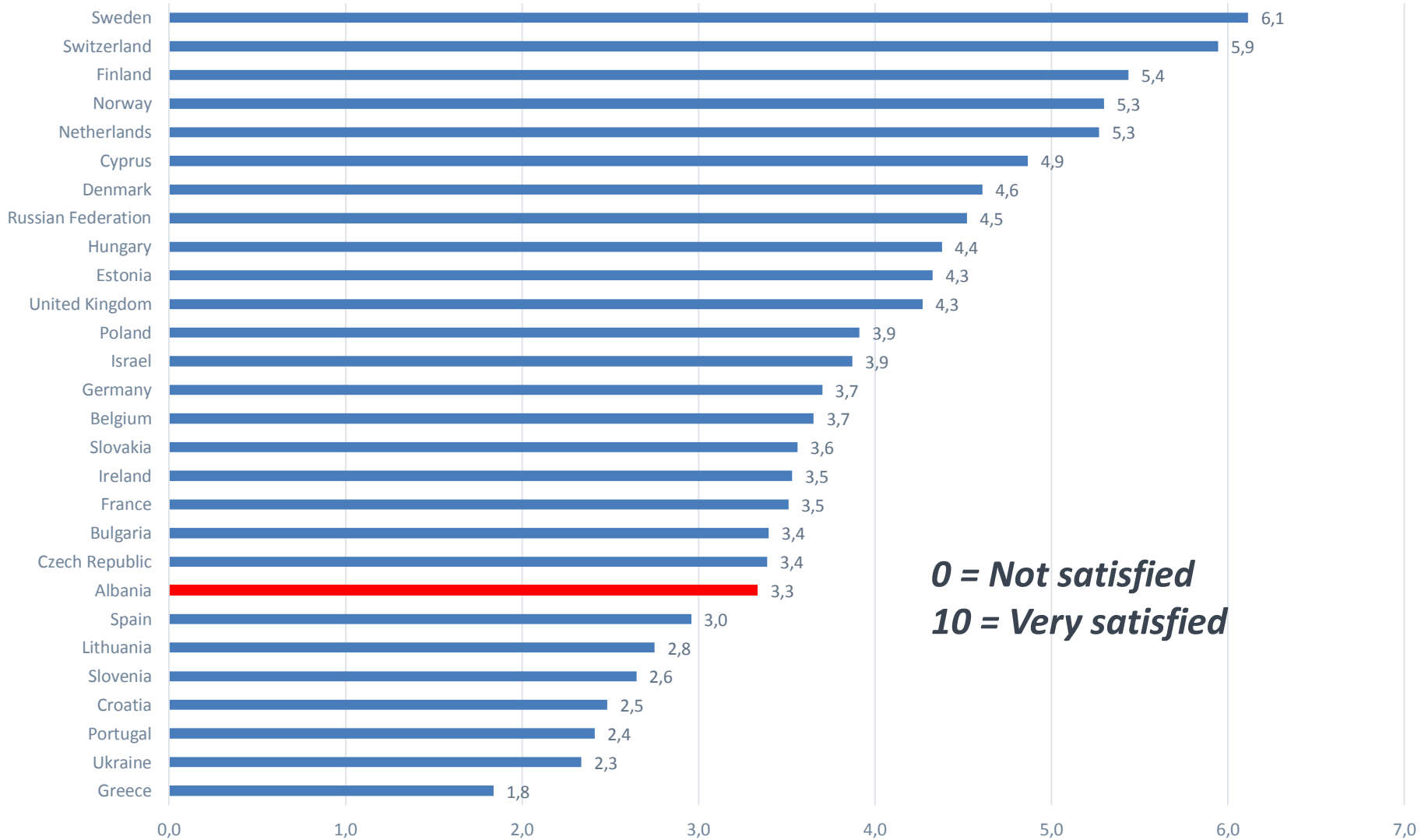
## Does or does not apply for Albania

**10 = It very much applies**

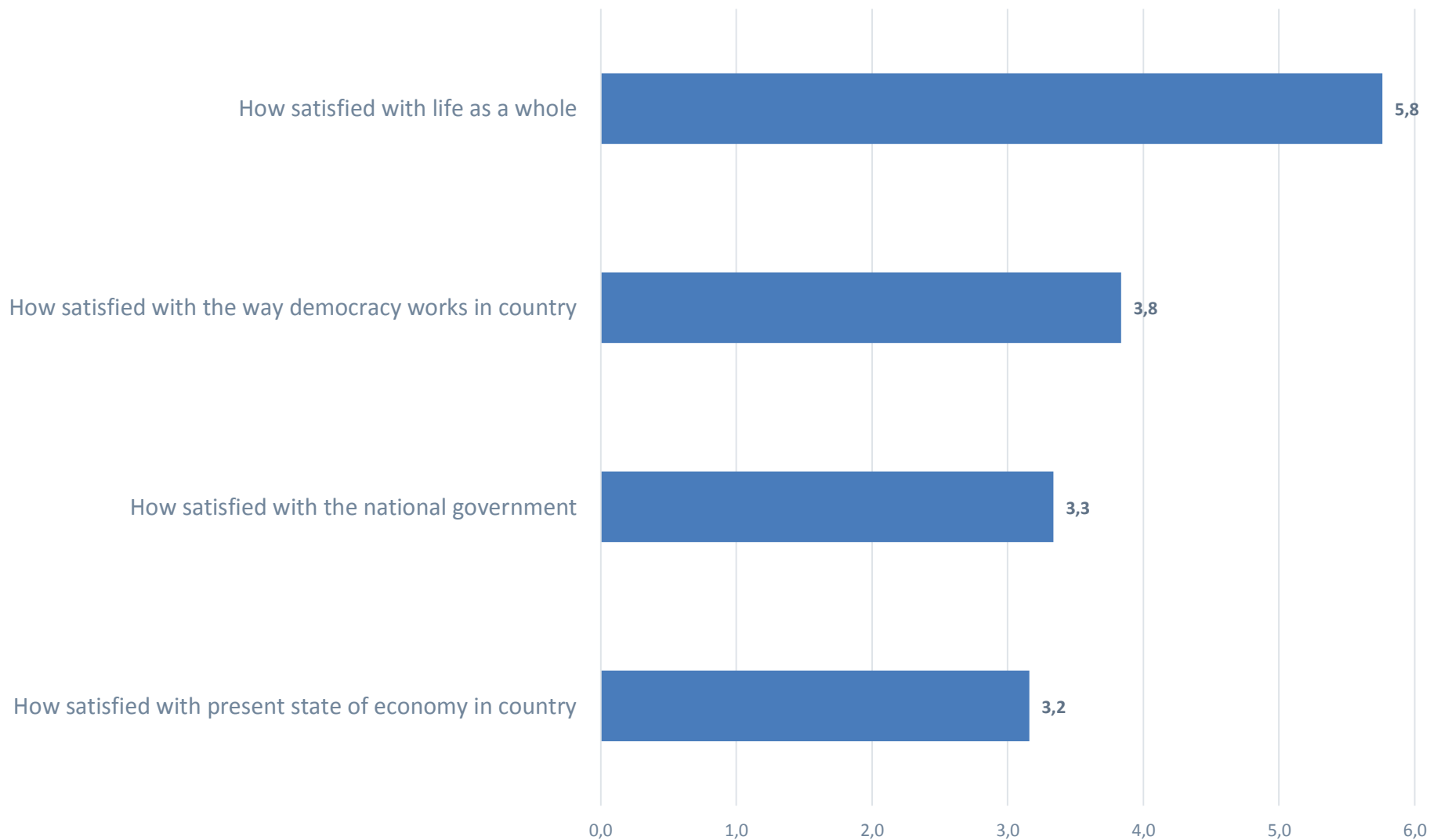


## How satisfied with the national government

*10 = Very satisfied*

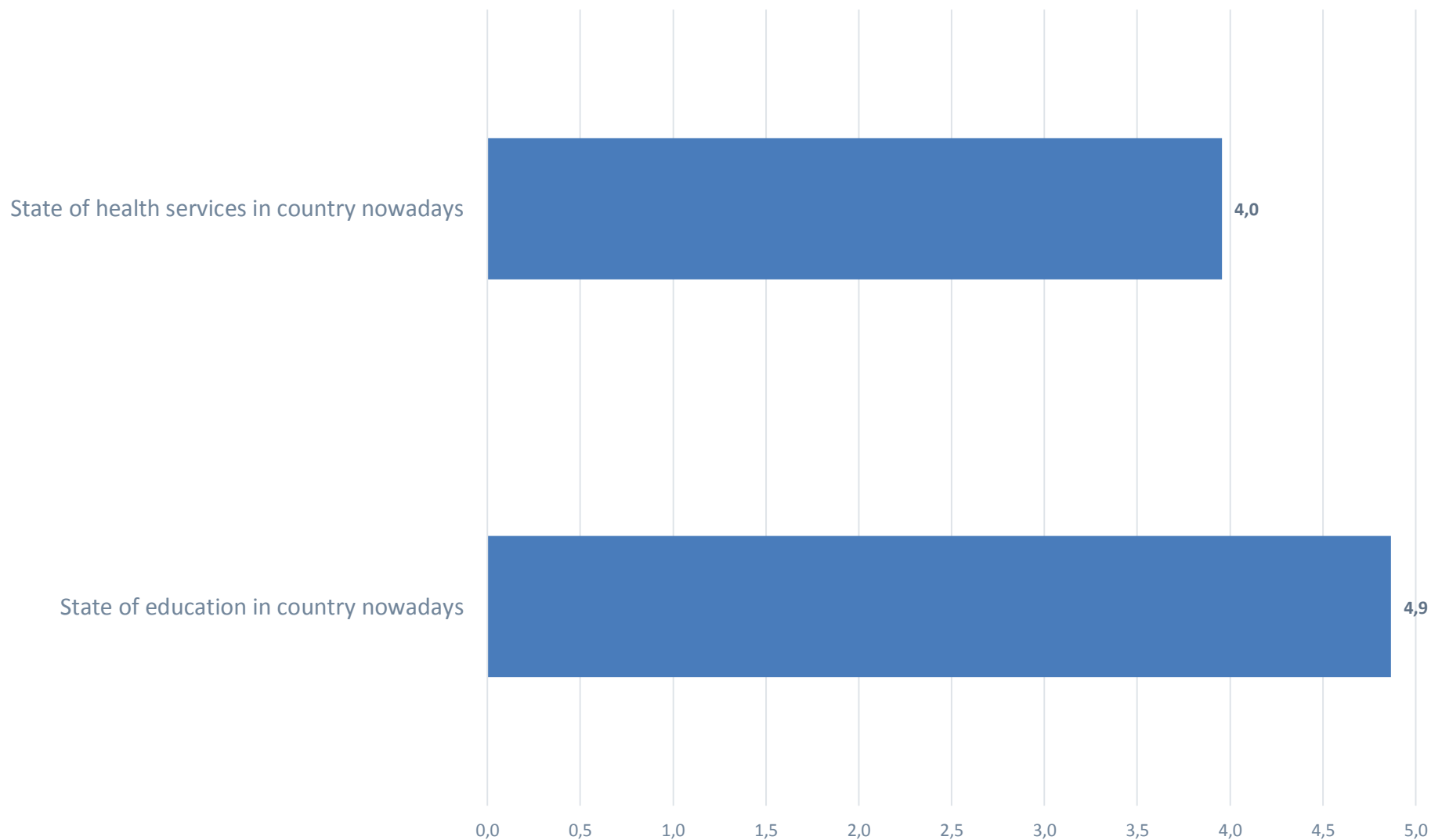
## Satisfaction index in Albania (from 0 to 10)



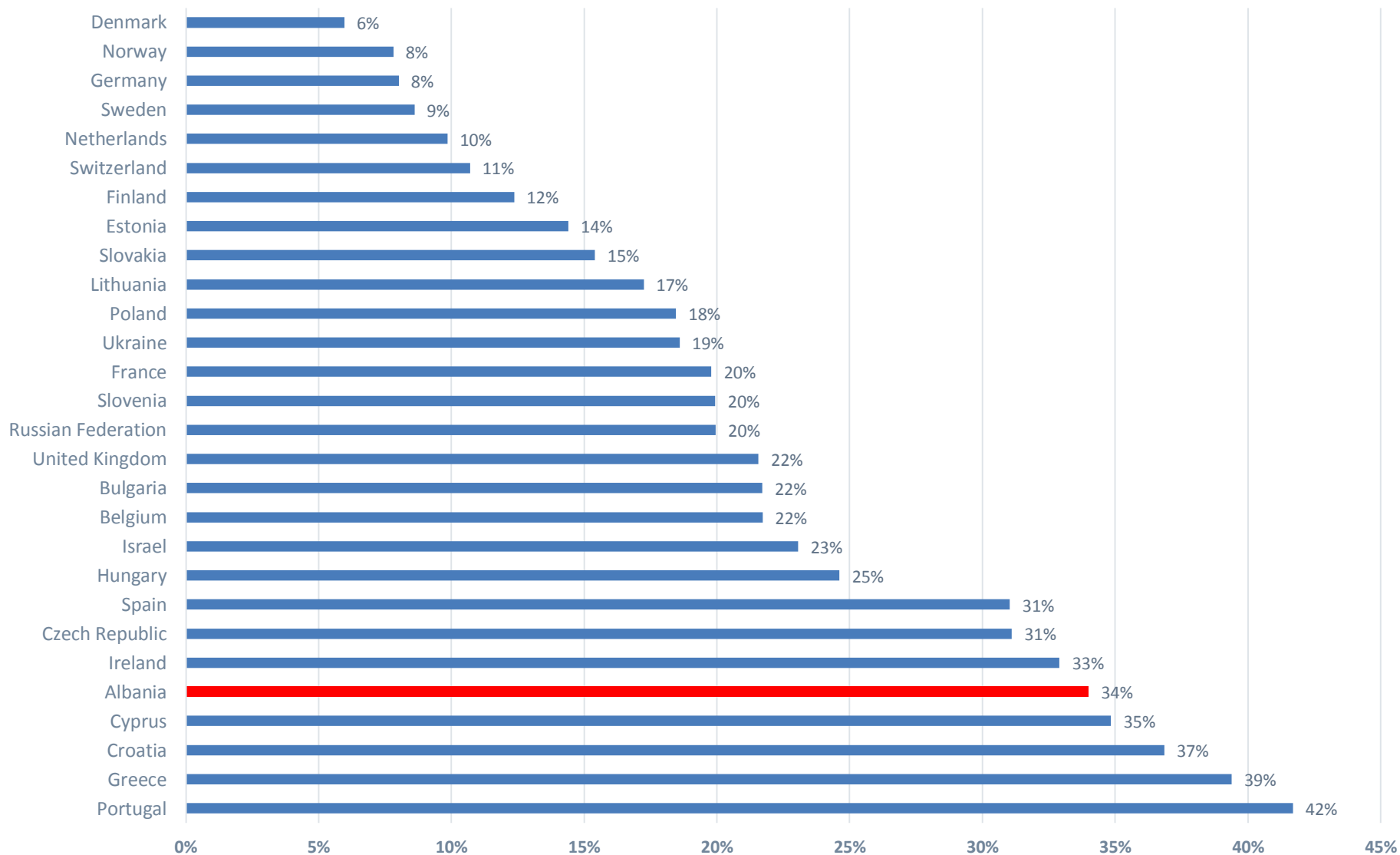

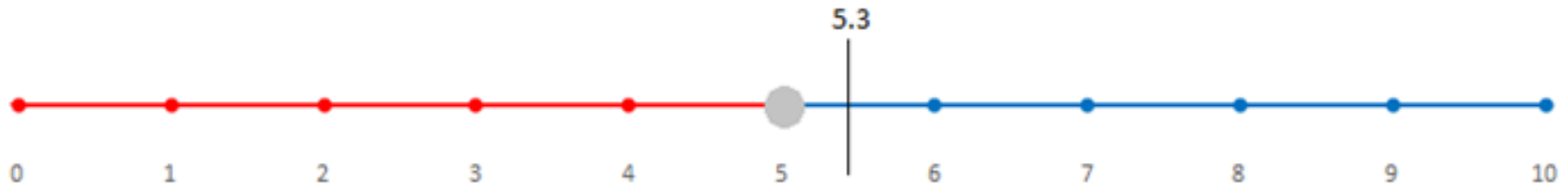
### State of public services (from 0 to 10)

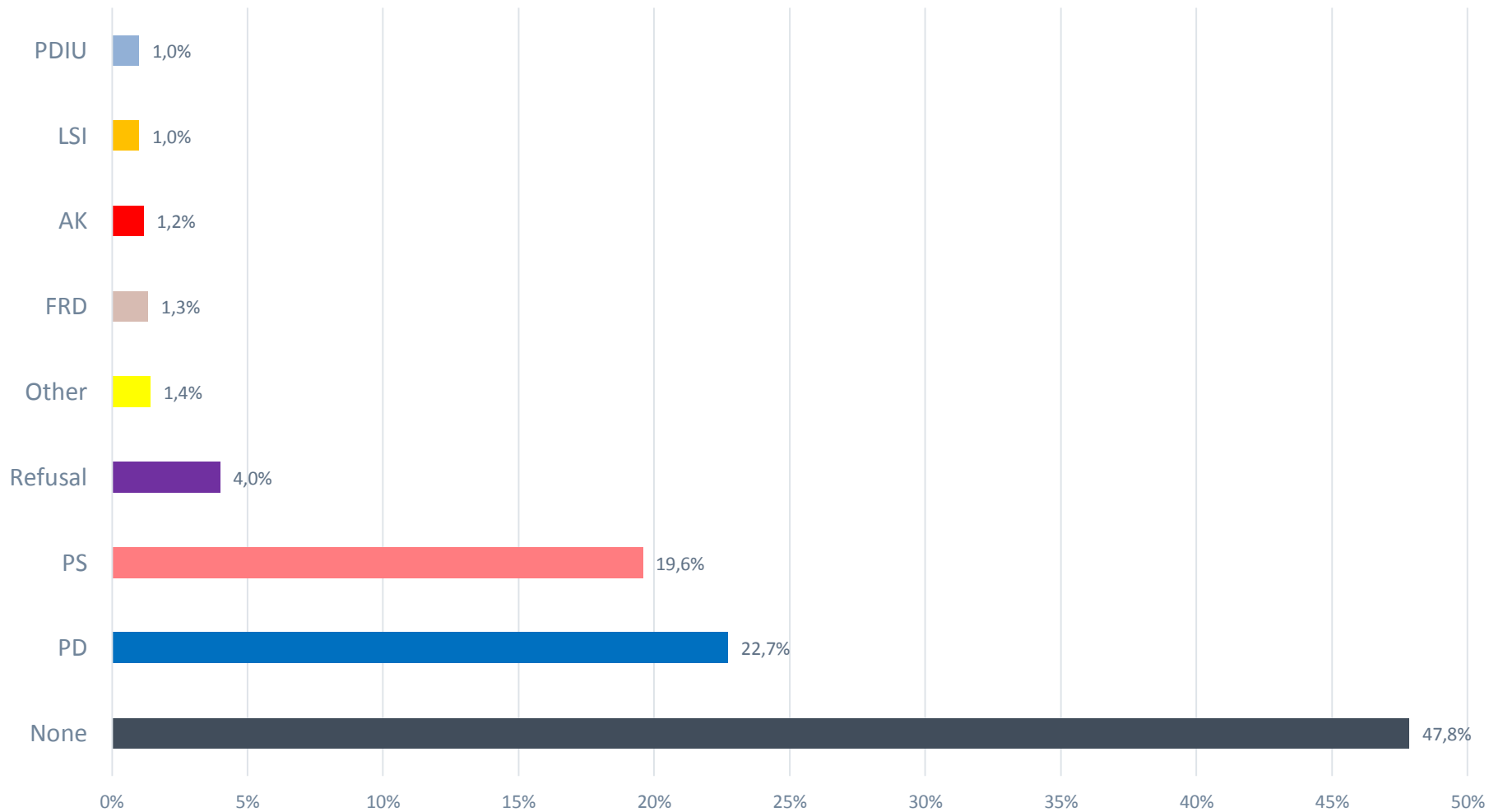

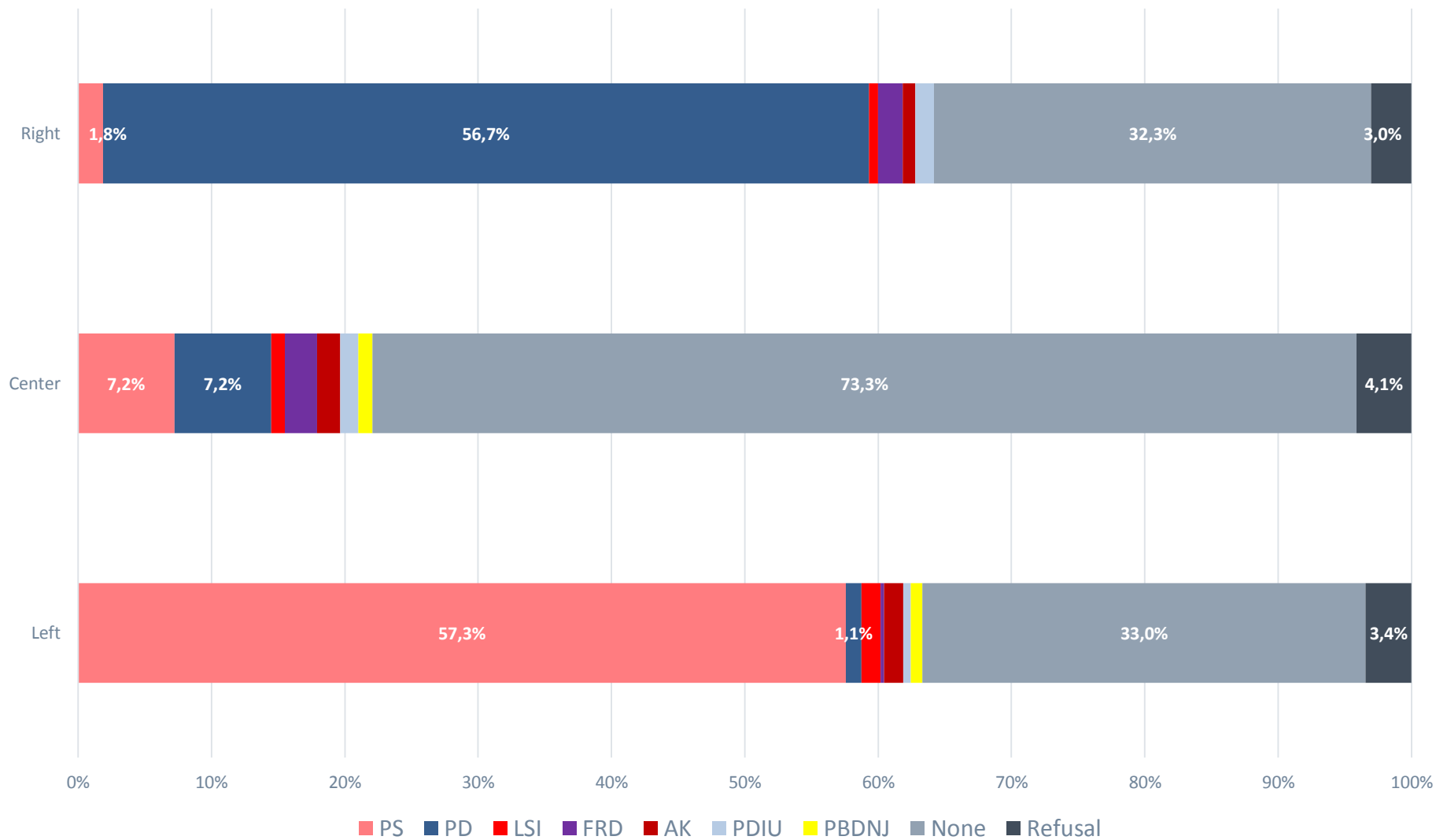
*0 = Extreme Left*

Party feeling closer to

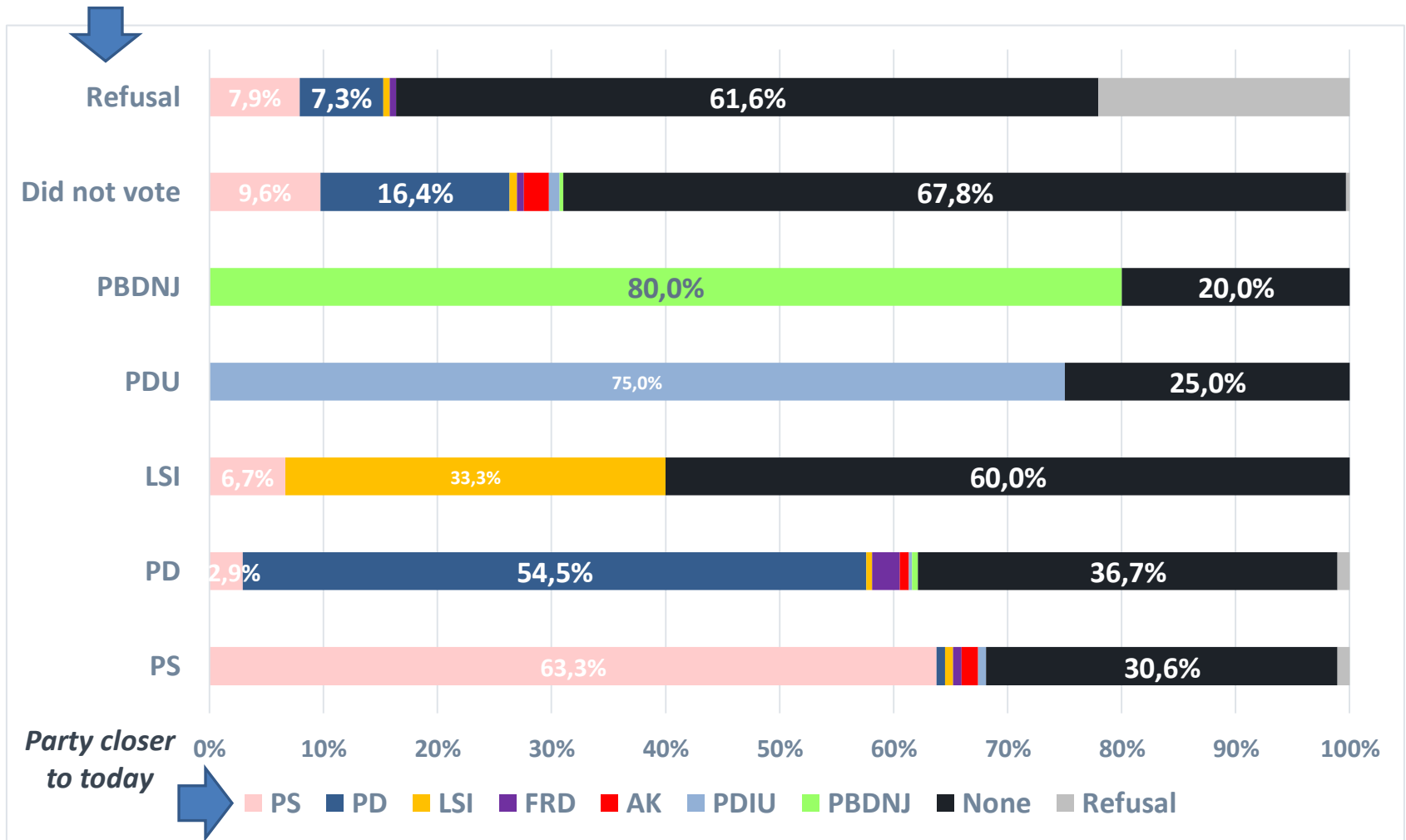


## Party feeling closer to, by placement on left-right scale

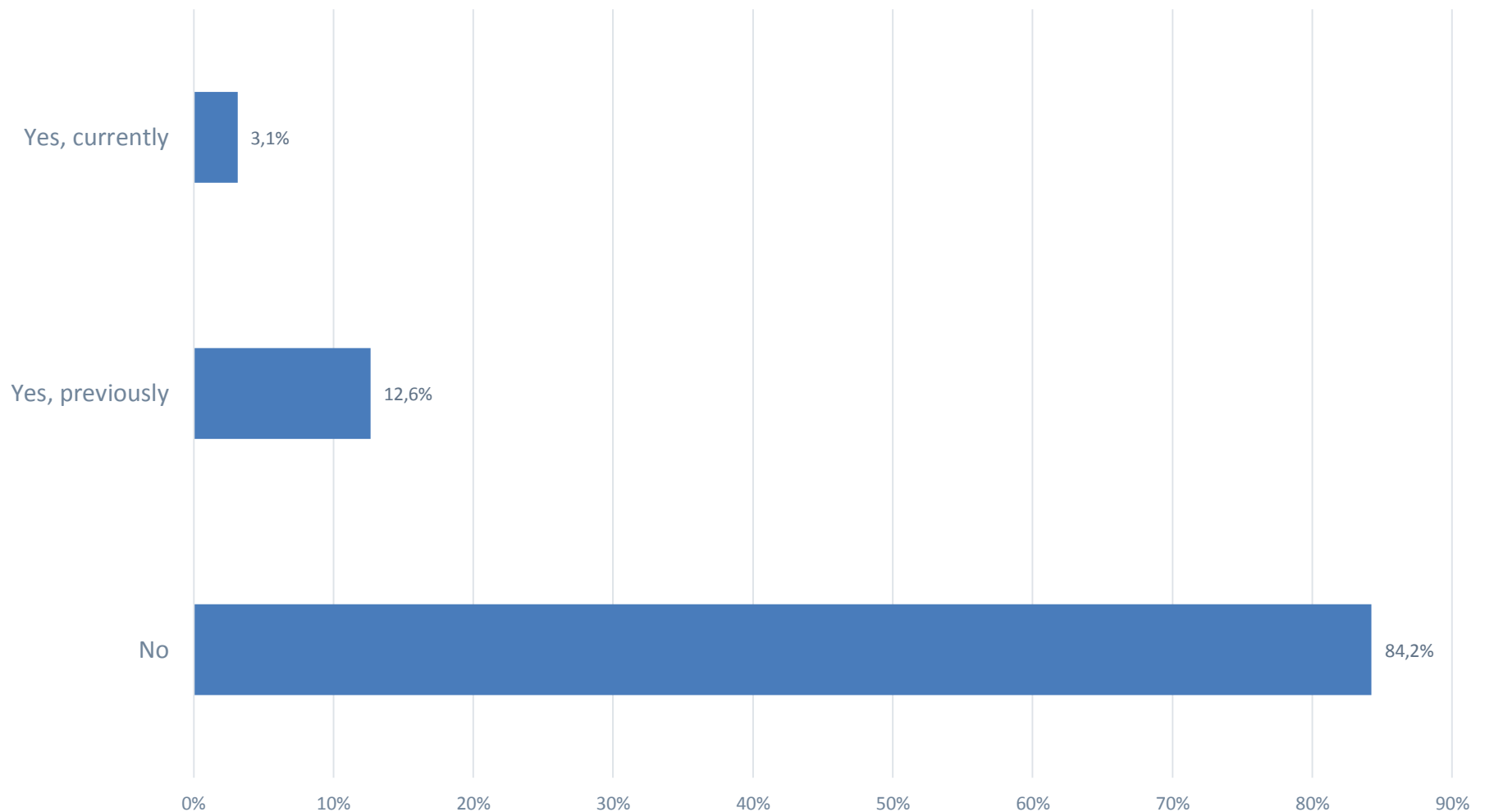
## Party voted in 2009, by party feeling closer to today



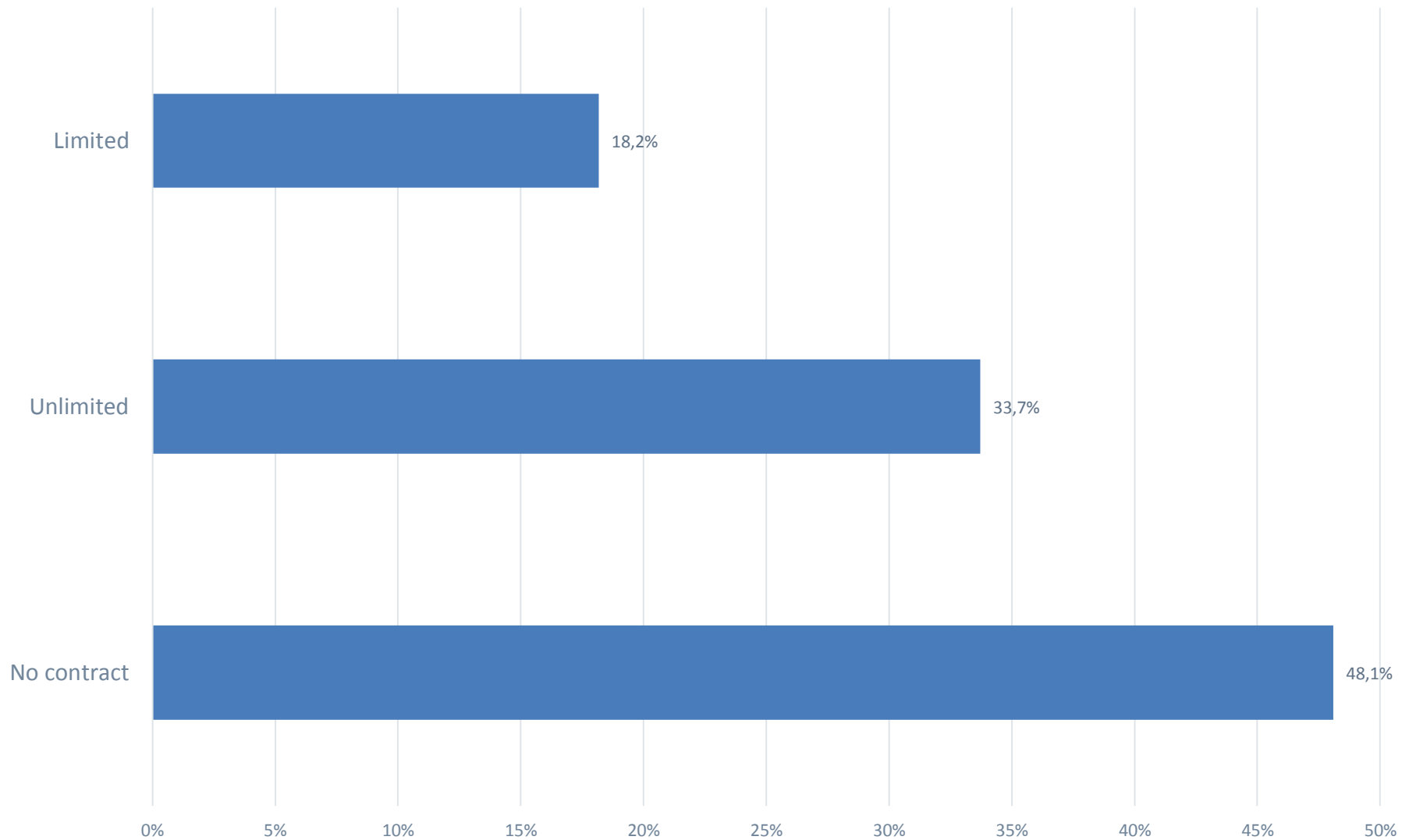

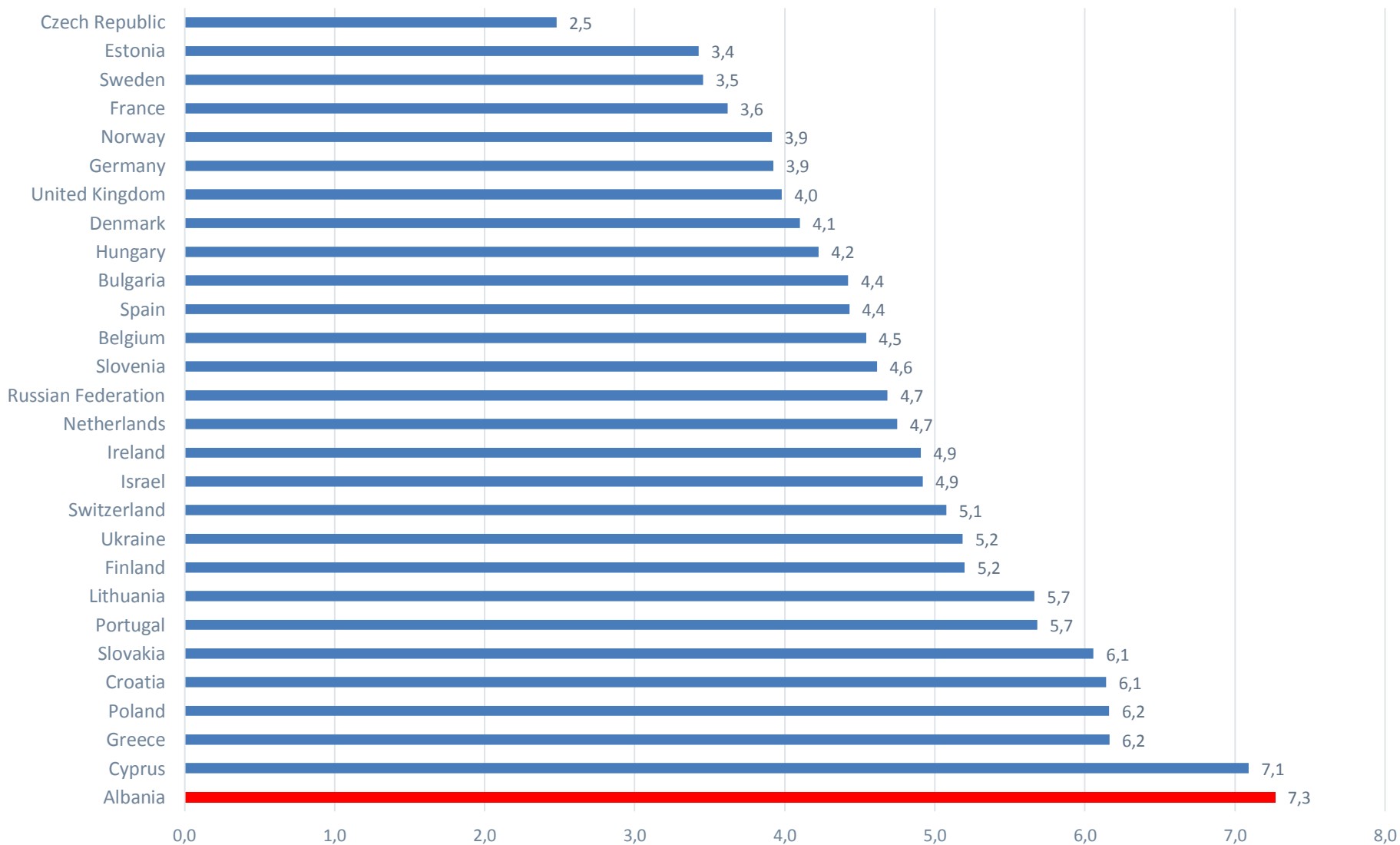
Member of trade union or similar organisation

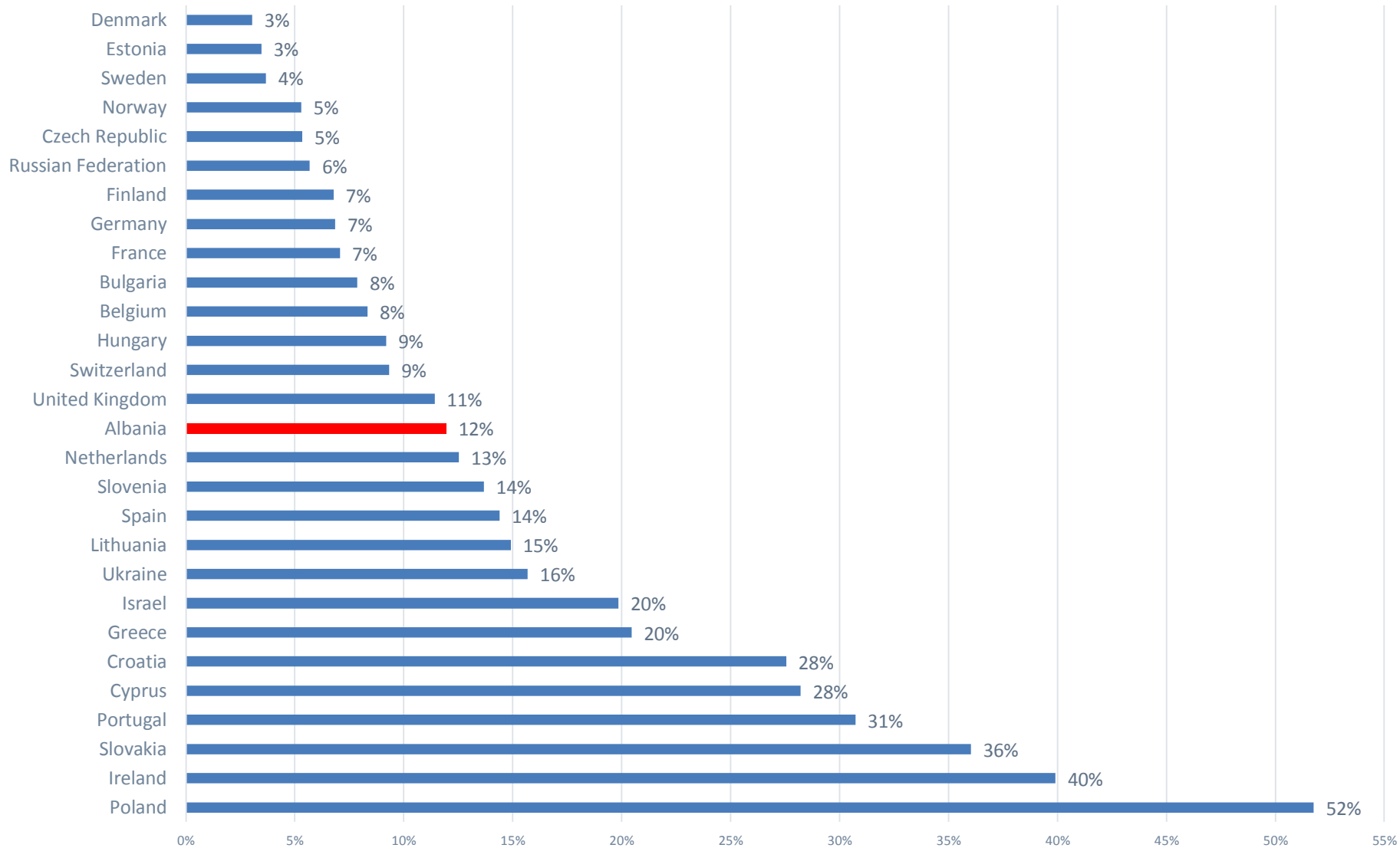


Regardless of whether you belong to a particular religion, how religious would you say you are?

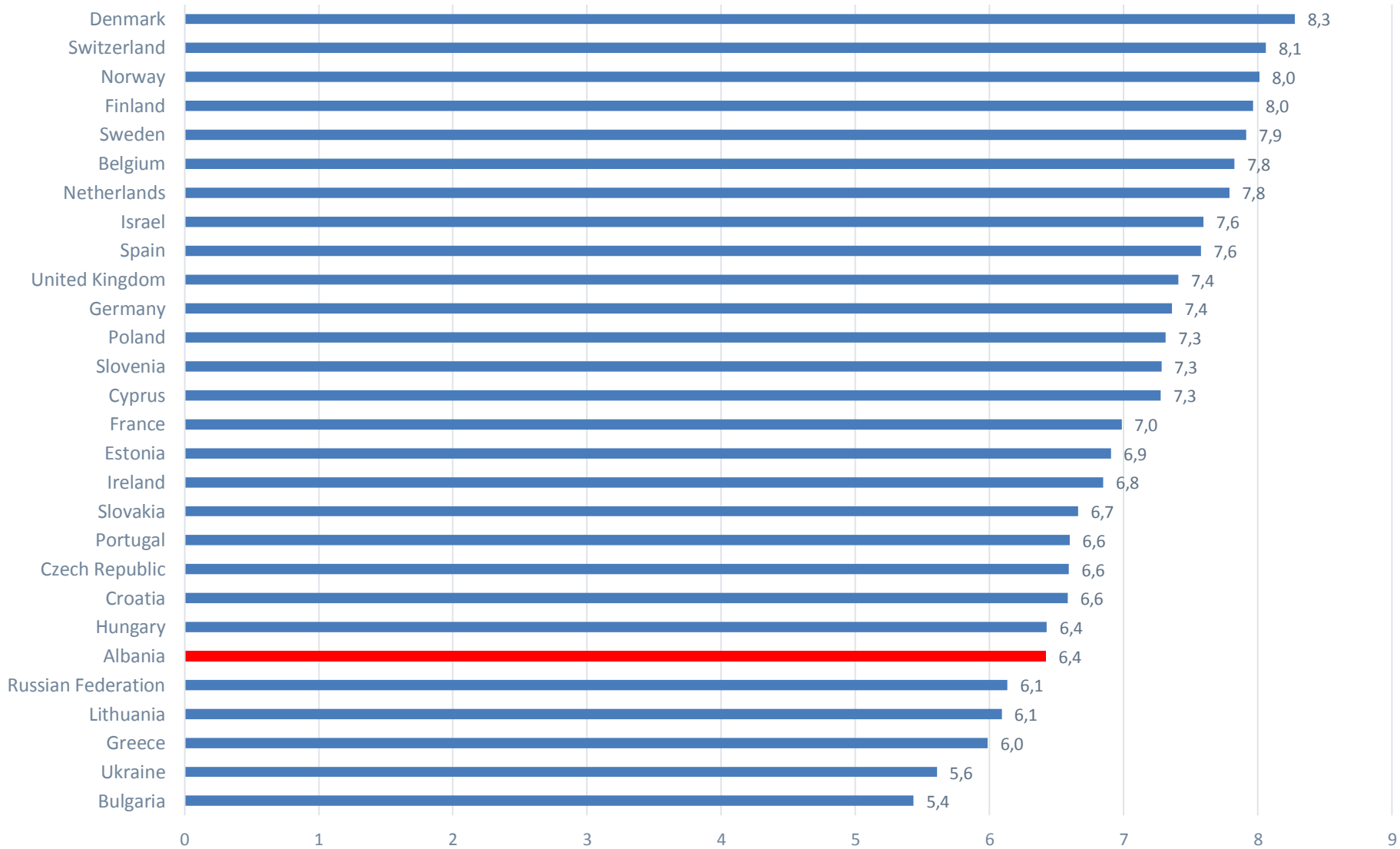


**0 = Not at all religious**

## Attending religious services (apart from special occasions) at least once a week

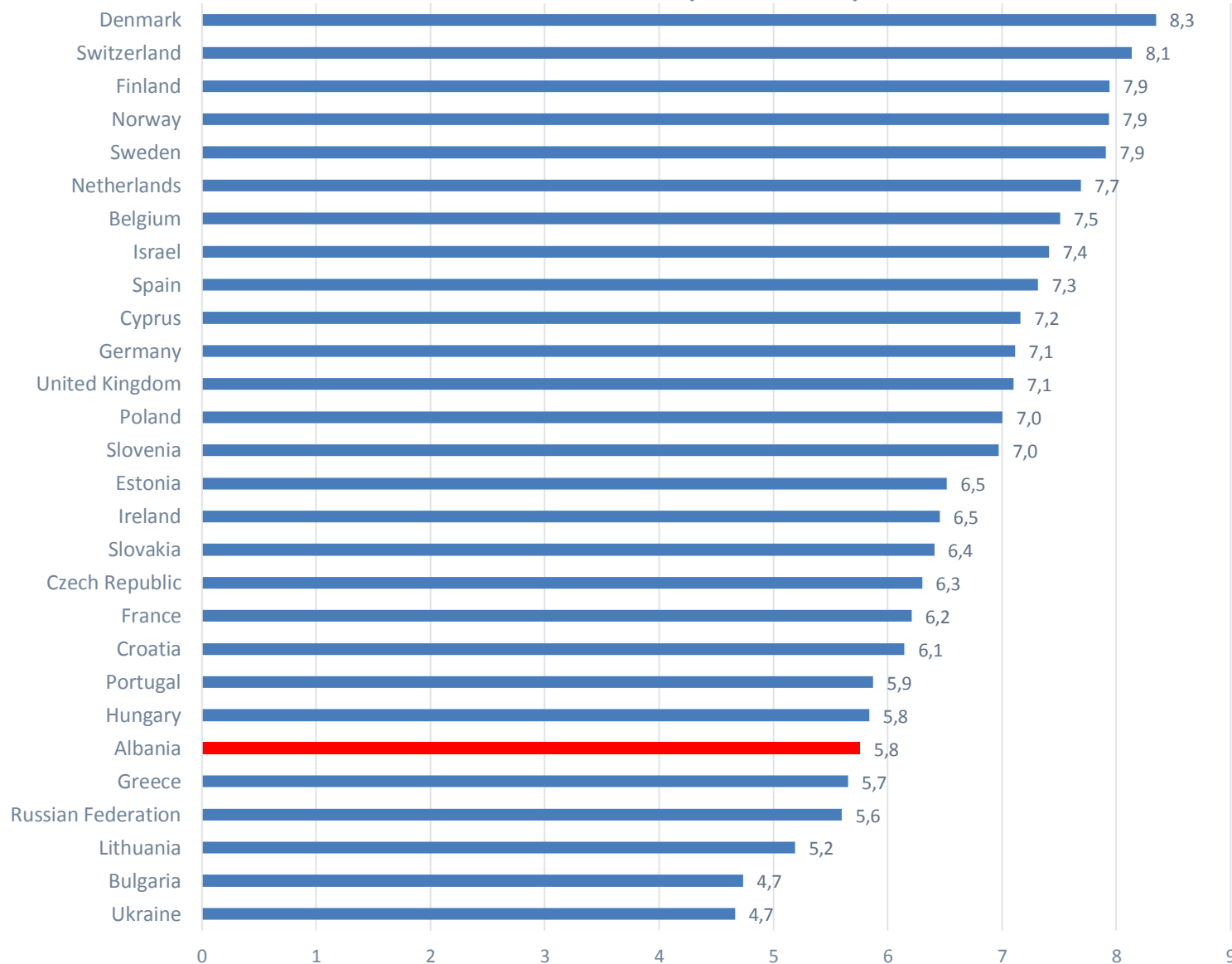


## How happy are you (from 0 to 10)



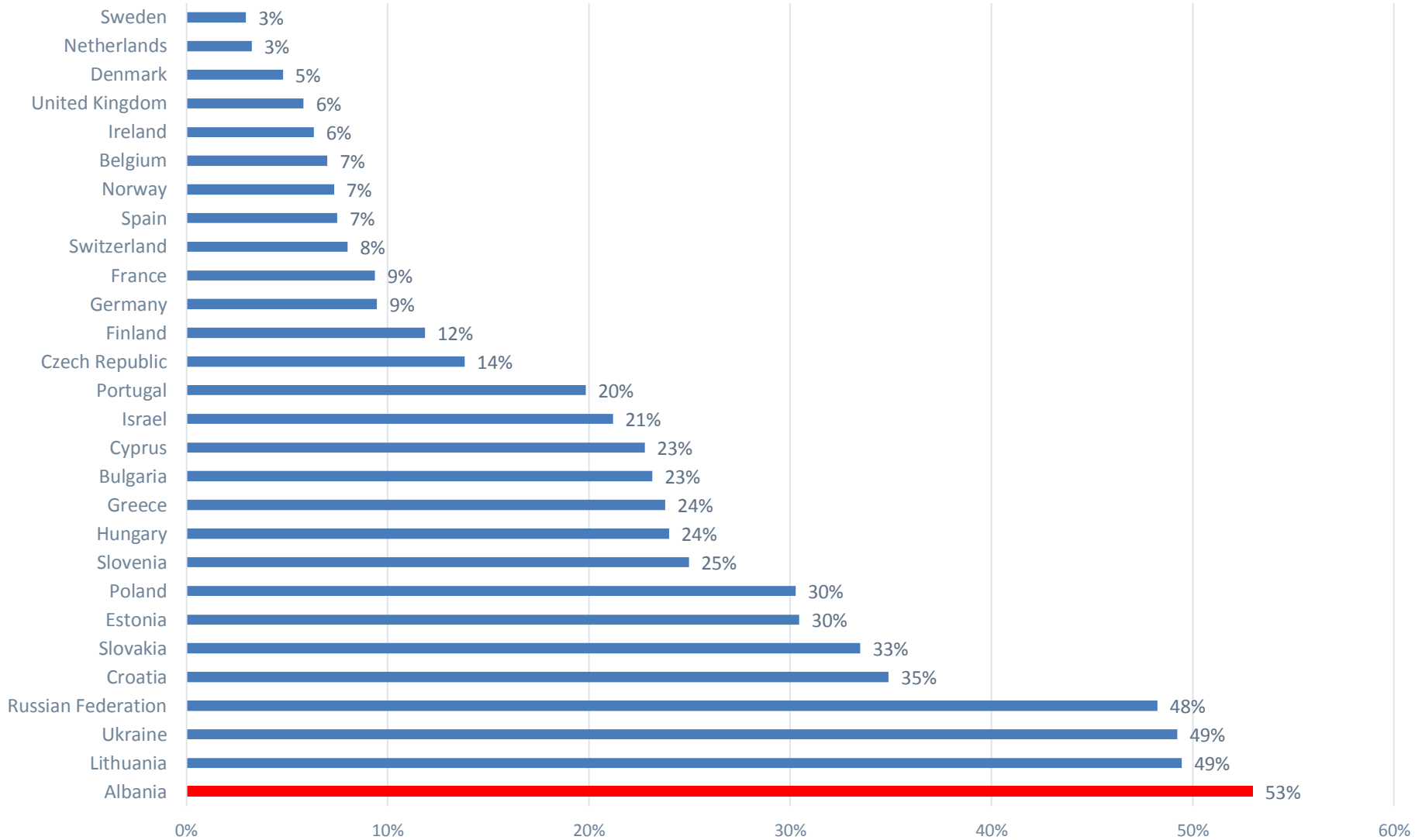
**0 = Very unhappy**
